

ANOTHER NEW PARK!

Borough to Acquire Property of Historical and Environmental Significance



The Borough will soon be completing the purchase of a 3+ acre property of great historical and environmental significance. This property, located to the left of "Lachmund's Bend," where Old Tappan Road takes an abrupt turn to the right when you are nearing the River Vale border, has been owned for many years by Mr. Henry Bonnabel. It will be called Bonnabel Park, dedicated to the memory of his wife, Erna Knies Bonnabel.

Located on the banks of the Hackensack River, the property is included in the Borough's Environmentally Sensitive District, a zone which is comprised primarily of properties in the watershed areas adjacent to Lake Tappan

and the Hackensack River. Hike the property (as you will soon be able to do) and you will see an unusually large number of huge "specimen" trees. The property was one of the first identified as a priority for acquisition by the Borough's Open Space Advisory Committee.

Approximately half of the purchase price will be funded with a State Green Acres grant that has been obtained by the Borough. The Borough will leverage the purchase with its Open Space Trust fund. The money in this Trust Fund comes from the collection of \$.01 per \$100 of assessed valuation on each property in the Bor-

ough, as approved by the voters in 1999 and renewed in 2004. The Borough will also be applying for a County Open Space Trust Fund grant in the next grant cycle to further help fund this acquisition.

THE PAST

This is the former site of Lachmund's Hotel, a popular place to gather for entertainment or to rest in early Old Tappan. Built in the late 1870's, the hotel was originally known as Brookside Hall. It was a sprawling two-story structure on the banks of the Hackensack River. The property was once incorporated into Eastwood (present day River Vale). At a



special election on April 23, 1896, the residents of Old Tappan voted 22 to 1 to annex the property, effectively making the Hackensack River the dividing line between the two towns.


The rich history of Lachmund's Hotel, pictures and all, is wonderfully recounted in the Borough's Centennial book, "1894-1994 Edition":

"Lachmund's Hotel was built by John Lachmund, Sr. and housed the family's living quarters and a complement of dining rooms and bedrooms for summer vacationers. At one end was a general store for year-round use of residents and travelers stopping by. On the second floor was a huge ballroom which easily accommodated wedding receptions, social club dinners, large card parties, vaudeville shows and early movies. There was also a tavern on the premises which undoubtedly added to the gaiety of Collignon's mill hands [Collignon Brothers Chair Factory was nearby] on a Saturday night. The Lachmund family staffed it all."

"After 1896 Lachmund's was also the polling place where everyone voted (every man that is – the vote for women didn't come until 1920). John Lachmund, Jr. (or Johnny, as he was known) voted first because he lived there. Ballots were marked in pencil with an 'X', and tales are told of close votes where hot arguments took place and a crooked or misshapen 'X' was fiercely challenged. And there was one time when 100 registered voters were listed but 110 ballots were counted. Some jokester suggested that ten women had sneaked in!"

"After 1896, the Mayor and Council, with Johnny Lachmund as Borough Clerk [he served in this position for 57 years!], held their meetings in one of the smaller card rooms, after which they settled down to serious games of pinochle."

Lachmund's Hotel remained a focal point of Old Tappan social life until it was torn down in 1954, shortly after "Johnny" Lachmund's death.



THE FUTURE

This beautiful property will be forever restricted from development. It will be forever dedicated as open space. With a generous donation from the Bonnabel family, the Borough intends to make Bonnabel Park a place where the public can relax, walk around, and perhaps reel in a few fish. Given its historical significance and its environmental importance, this property is a valuable addition to the Borough's growing open space inventory.

6 OPENINGS FOR JUNIOR FIREFIGHTERS



Junior Firefighters must be 16-17 years old, able-bodied, and in good health. They are expected to respond to as many alarms as possible, in all kinds of weather, and be ready to perform physically demanding firefighting work. They must regularly and punctually attend the Department's monthly drill (training session) at 7:30 pm on the first Monday of each month, as well as some of the training and maintenance sessions held on other Monday nights at 7:30 pm throughout the year. Junior Firefighters are provided with full protective equipment at no charge. You need not be a resident of Old Tappan to join, but Old Tappan residents will be given preference if there are more applicants than vacancies.

RECENTLY ENACTED ORDINANCES

Ordinance No. 929-06 Amending Streets Ordinanace Adopted 1/16/07

No development of any parcel of land which creates three or less total lots shall be permitted if the development includes creation of a new roadway which would render any other parcel of land not owned by the developer a corner lot, unless said owner joins in the application for development.

Ordinance No. 930-06 Sale of Borough Property Adopted 2/5/07

Block 1805, Lot 8, Washington Avenue, approximately 11,700 square feet; and Commodore Court Right-of-Way, Wescott Street, approximately 12,500 square feet

PETITION TO GOVERNOR TO CHANGE SCHOOL FUNDING FORMULA

School districts in the suburban areas of New Jersey receive a disproportionately smaller share of state funding, resulting in higher property taxes for their residents. It's unfair, it's wrong, and it needs to be changed.

School taxes are responsible for approximately 55% to 65% of property tax bills. In New Jersey there are 615 school districts; 31 Abbott school districts and 584 regular school districts. In the 2006 state budget \$10.4 billion dollars was spent on education. More than half of that amount goes to just 31 school districts; the remainder is distributed to the remaining 584 districts.

The Comprehensive Educational Improvement and Financing Act of 1996 (CEIFA) has not been funded since 2001-2002. The funds have been frozen for the last 5 years causing massive local property tax increases.

The result of these two factors has been a yearly increase in our property taxes to fund our schools. The legislators of the 30th District, Senator Singer and Assemblymen Malone and Dancer are leading a state-wide petition aimed at bringing a voice to New Jersey taxpayers on this issue. They have asked us to urge our residents to sign this petition, which they will then present to Governor Corzine. Copies of the petition will be available in the schools and at Borough Hall until the last week in March.

SCHOLARSHIPS OFFERED

Each year the Old Tappan Elementary PTA offers two \$1,00 Martin G. Podmayer Awards to students graduating from high school who plan to continue their education at a four-year accredited college. The PTA also offers one scholarship in the amount of \$1,000 to a graduating student who will pursue training in a technical or vocational school. Eligible students must be residents of Old Tappan and graduates of Charles DeWolf Middle School.

The Recreation Director has involvement in nearly all aspects of the Borough's exemplary recreation programs, including administration of the sports programs and summer camp, bookkeeping, purchasing, and field usage scheduling. Larry has modernized the position through the use of today's technology, from email to specialized registration programs to the use of online requisitions, and his contributions to the Borough's recreational programs are his legacy.

At the January 6, 2007, reorganization meeting, the Mayor & Council endorsed the recommendation of the Recreation Commission and appointed Gloria Weisner as Old Tappan's new Recreation Director.

We wish both Larry and Gloria happiness and success as they pursue their new endeavors.
